Parks & Recreation
Monthly Report for Mar./Apr. 2009

The Town of Camp Verde Parks and Recreation Department is dedicated to providing quality recreational, educational, cultural, fitness, social and environmental opportunities. This department strives to meet the diverse needs of the community.

A great deal has been happening at Parks & Recreation since our last meeting. I will do my best to give you a recap of each month.

March:

The wind played havoc with several of the Town building, the worst being at the pool and a dugout at Butler Park. The dugout roof was repaired and put back up and shingles replaced throughout Town, but the pool roof is still waiting to be repaired. After repairs it will also need to be hot mopped and the cost is \$3,600.

In March, a group of LDS teens from Texas spent a few days in Camp Verde and wanted to do a community service project. We had sixteen teens come out to Butler Park and paint buildings and equipment. They did a great job and we really appreciated the help. With the painting that they did and a great deal of work from Maintenance staff, the park looked wonderful for Little League opening. Staff also fertilized the Butler Park fields and did some work on the sprinkler system.

A light was installed on the flagpole at Town Hall and staff painted the pole. It really looks nice. We have a local young man who built and installed a sign at the Teen Center as his Eagle Scout project. If you get time, stop by and see it.

In March staff attended CPR training.

The Arizona Game and Fish Clinic was attended by approximately 80 people. This is less than last year, but the weather was cold and windy. Our Recreation Supervisor did a great job with the Canoe Challenge. Golf League began Mar. 13th and everyone is having a great time.

Staff began working on the fiscal 09/10 budget.

April:

I am sure you are all aware of the fact that Council voted to no longer sponsor the Cornfest, Fort Verde Days and the Pecan and Wine Festival. I believe with the austere condition of the budget that they made the right decision. We have been very fortunate and have had someone step up and take over each event. I will work with the groups to make sure that the transition goes as smoothly as possible. A Fort Verde Days meeting will be held at Sweet Grace, located on Hollamon Street on May 11th at 3:30 p.m. The group is currently forming committees and could use your help. The position of Parks & Recreation Administrative Assistant/Events Coordinator will not be filled at this time due to the hiring freeze.

Since we are short staffed we did not feel like we could do a credible job, this year, Suzie Thompson of Arizona Central Land and Home took over Operation Prom. She and her daughter did a fantastic job. Thirteen girls received dresses, flowers and hairdos and nine young men received tux rental, flowers, prom tickets and dinner certificates.

Applications are ready to go out to all of the schools for Summer Program. We hope to increase the number of children who participate this year. I have included the registration form in your packet.

The IGA with the School District for the parking lot and trail located between the district office and Butler Park soccer field was not renewed. This will have very little impact on Parks & Recreation, but it will impact youth sports organizations. They will now be charged a fee each time the parking lot.


The Annual Easter Egg hunt was a success even with the cold, rainy weather. At the last minute we decided to move the event inside the gym. Everyone had a great time.



The NBL is a non-profit organization that has been promoting BMX racing on a national, regional, state, local and international level since its inception in 1974. **The NBL is the only BMX body recognized in the United States by the Union Cycliste Internationale, (UCI).** Founded in 1900, the UCI is the world governing body of all international cycling. UCI is the International Federation of Cycling and represents more than 173 countries and their National Cycling Federations. **USA Cycling is the UCI affiliated National Cycling Federation in the United States and the NBL is the recognized BMX affiliate.** The NBL is aligned with both USA Cycling and UCI, the organizations responsible for the 2008 Olympic Games where BMX will make its debut as a medal sport.

In 2003, the International Olympic Committee announced together with UCI that BMX racing will be included in the 2008 Summer Olympic Games in Beijing, China bringing BMX to a whole new level of prestige and excitement. **The NBL understands the Olympians of tomorrow start with grassroots programming at local tracks.** The NBL is dedicated to supporting local, grassroots tracks by providing free racing supplies (i.e. race program, applications, race reports, banners, promotional materials, etc.), free official licenses during training, excellent insurance coverage, public service announcement tapes and local program known as LEAP, Local Earned Awards

If there are any special needs you require, such as construction of the BMX track, please bring them to my attention. We will be glad to help in any way we can.



The National Bicycle League has been providing an exciting recreational opportunity for the youth of your community for nearly three decades, and we plan to continue these efforts.

Bicycle motocross is a special activity for several reasons. First, anyone is eligible to participate. A child needs only a bicycle, a helmet and a long-sleeve shirt to race. BMX has many benefits for local communities. Often you will find mock tracks and jumps built in the woods by kids because they have the desire to challenge themselves while riding their bikes, they want to be the BMX Pro they see on TV. This is a non secure, unsupervised area and can be quite dangerous. We offer a fun and safe place to race on a track built with safety as a top priority but technical enough to challenge every rider from beginner to expert and everyone gets to participate, in BMX no one sits the bench. The sport is a great way for families to come together and once again bond as a family unit. Dad's are generally the mechanics making sure the bicycle is in good working order and Mom's along with siblings are the cheerleaders of the group. Riders and their families have fun while getting good exercise. Listed below you will see the benefits of BMX for the youth and for the community.

The NBL is a non-profit organization that has been promoting BMX racing on the national, regional, state, local and international levels since its inception in 1974. The NBL is the BMX body recognized in the United States by Union Cycliste Internationale (UCI). Founded in 1900, the UCI is the world governing body of all international cycling. Headquartered in Aigle, Switzerland, the UCI is the International Federation of Cycling and represents the associations of 173 countries and their National Cycling Federations. USA Cycling is the UCI affiliated National Cycling Federation in the United States, and is governing BMX under their umbrella organization the National Bicycle League (NBL). The National Federation (NBL) will, together with each country's National Olympic Committee select the riders that will go to the Olympics. This selection will be based on the UCI ranking as well as results in the NBL National series and UCI races such as the UCI World Championship race.

The UCI is the liaison between the International Olympic Committee and the National Cycling Federations, managing rules, rankings and calendars for all cycling disciplines. The UCI is also the sole owner of the UCI BMX World Championships and the UCI BMX Supercross World Cup.

In 2003, the International Olympic Committee announced together with UCI that BMX racing will be included in the 2008 Summer Olympic Games in Beijing, China, bringing BMX to a whole new level of prestige and excitement.

National Bicycle League sanctioned BMX facilities have a profound effect on the communities in which they are located. BMX tracks literally become sanctuaries for the youth of the community. They are a place where the participants of all ages and skill levels can come and participate in the sport they love while being classified with others of a similar skill level. In BMX there are no bench sitters and no coaches to tell riders they are not good enough to be in the starting line-up.

NBL BMX facilities have a positive impact on the community in more ways than one. BMX tracks provide an excellent form of recreation for the community, and an excellent source of revenue for local businesses.

As the sport of BMX has continued to grow there has been a significant interest in trails. We as a organization felt we needed to give something to the youth and adults who are interested in other avenues of BMX so not only does the NBL provide the **Best In BMX** we are also the **only** sanctioning body of BMX to offer your facility the option to host a **trail facility** as well. Information is enclosed.

Benefits of Affiliation with the National Bicycle League:

- The NBL is a non-profit organization, which is the oldest and most established BMX sanctioning body in the World
- The NBL is an affiliate of USA Cycling, which is the governing body of all-Olympic cycling in the United States. Park facilities have the option to have an open track; however the landowner must provide insurance on public use days. The NBL provides insurance on supervised scheduled event days and supervised scheduled practices.

- \$3,000 Accidental Death and Dismemberment
- **Free-** official licenses to volunteers participating in the training session
- **Free** public announcement tapes
- A **free** race supply start up package, sent annually upon submission of re-affiliation papers and track schedule to the NBL office

- New full-member number plates and numbers, as long as program remains active

NBL BMX is a family sport therefore when riders are not practicing/racing or other family members may not race they will look for fun things to do outside of BMX. This gives the cities tourism a boost by providing other means of recreation.

As you can see all cycling is under one umbrella and the NBL is the only sanctioning body of BMX to be included under that umbrella. We as an organization would like to work with you to give your members and parents the enjoyment of BMX in your community. Riders who like to compete have that opportunity through the NBL without being under financial burden

The NBL will provide the following at no cost:

- Provide an NBL approved builder to construct the BMX track
- Opportunity to host future NBL major events. **Track must run a full racing season, minimum of 15 races and 15 practice sessions, under the NBL sanction to be eligible or considered to host an NBL Regional or National the following year.** Facility must meet national requirements.
- **Free** NBL race computer software and free membership update disks, to assist in advertising and mailings.
- Training for volunteers
- Promotional material.
- **10 free** copies of the BMX Today magazine sent each month.

Insurance fee of \$1.00 per rider, per event, with a base payment of \$20.00 and a maximum payment of \$75.00 for single and double point races. Practice insurance fee is a rate of \$1.00 per rider with a maximum payment of \$20.00 per scheduled practice.
- Participant accident coverage Blanket Medical Expense subject to a deductible per claim (Blanket Medical Expense EXCESS over any primary medical coverage).
- Accidental Death and Dismemberment coverage.
- **Free-** Official licenses during training session.
- **Free** public announcement tapes.
- **Free** race supply start up package, sent at the beginning of each racing season, upon track schedule submitted to the NBL office.
- Track listing in the BMX Today and on the NBL web site, which will include track schedules.
- New full-member number plates and numbers.
- LEAP Plates, awarded to the top 10 Rookies, Novices and Experts and to the top 5 in Cruisers and Girls at each track, as long as the program remains active.
- LEAP Jacket to be awarded to the top points rider in Expert, Cruiser, Girl, Novice and Rookie, as long as the program remains active.
- **Run a minimum of 15 races within the race season and earn a \$200.00 rebate.** Track must be in good standing and as long program remains active. Money awarded at the NBL annual Competition Congress.
- **Receive a dollar per rider for each new FULL membership signed up at your track.** Track must be in good standing and will continue as long as the program remains active. Money awarded at the NBL annual Competition Congress.

Track is responsible for emergency personnel, awards, state rider tax etc.
